New Funding Announced for Primary Care in Chatham-Kent

In Chatham-Kent, several health teams are set to receive a financial boost aimed at improving access to primary care services for local residents. The Chatham-Kent Family Health Team, Chatham-Kent Community Health Centres, Thamesview Family Health Team, and Tilbury District Family Health Team will be sharing a sum of \$1 million.



The funding is part of a larger \$110 million investment by Ontario to connect around 328,000 individuals to primary care teams, marking a significant stride towards ensuring all Ontarians have access to essential primary care services. Across Ontario, the investment will see the addition of over 400 new primary care providers as part of 78 new and expanded interprofessional primary care teams. These teams consist of various health professionals working collaboratively, including doctors, nurse practitioners, nurses, physiotherapists, social workers, and dietitians, among others.

The aim is to provide timely access to primary care, leading to faster diagnosis and treatment, improved health management, and reduced strain on emergency departments and walk-in clinics.

Despite the positive impact of the funding, concerns remain about the critical underfunding of primary healthcare in Ontario. Efforts to bolster primary care services are crucial for the well-being of residents and the overall healthcare system in the region.

MobileCare Visits Buxton for a Community Engagement Event



MobileCare Chatham-Kent and staff from Linck made a special stop at the Buxton Museum on Monday, February 26th to support members of the Black community with primary health care.

It was a successful event. As one example, there were four people from one family who received service from the MobileCare clinic on wheels - all who did not have a primary care provider.

"While the population of North Buxton is not large, everyone deserves accessible primary health care. The MobileCare staff were truly gracious, and our community is blessed to have the service" said Vivian Kilanko, co-Lead of CKOHT's Anti-Black Racism/Anti-Oppression Action Team, and a mental health counsellor at Linck.



Improving Healthcare Together Through BPSO

Through the Registered Nurse's Association of Ontario (RNAO), Best Practice Spotlight Organization (BPSO), the CKOHT, the BPSO Working Group and its champions are guided by the Quadruple Aim which serves to:

- Improve the patient experience
- Improve patient outcomes
- Improve the provider experience
- Lower cost of healthcare



This work started in 2021 and is a four year pathway to accreditation. The timeline below demonstrates where we are on this journey.



There are 13 organizations in Chatham-Kent who are participating in the accreditation process to achieve designation. To date the member organizations have implemented Best Practice Guideline #1: Patient & Family Centred Care, which has included organizations: conducting appointments in patient's preference (e.g. phone, video or in-person), offering on demand language translation services, including clients and patients in their own care planning, and implementing patient satisfaction surveys.

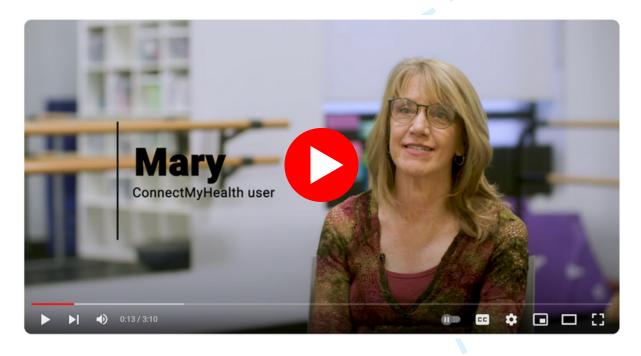
Current work is underway to finish up Best Practice Guideline #2: Transitions in Care & Service which has focused on: improved care planning when a patient moves to a different location for care to share information between the healthcare teams in order to support a successful transition. The BPSO Working Group looks forward to implementing two additional Best Practice Guidelines by the end of 2025 within the 13 organizations to improve patient care in Chatham-Kent.

ConnectMyHealth - New Online Patient Portal Empowering Patients' Health Journeys

Do you ever wish you could better understand your personal healthcare information? Take more accurate information away from an appointment? Share that information with other healthcare providers? Well now it is possible with the new online patient portal, 'Connect My Health'.

Primary Care Network Update

In January 2024, Ontario's Ministry of Health introduced "Primary Care Networks in Ontario Health Teams: Guidance Document" which states that that OHTs organize and connect with primary care to advance population health through integrated and equitable approaches to care. The Guidance Document outlines a vision, objectives and a common set of functions for Primary Care Networks (PCNs) to develop over time. By establishing a robust local PCN, OHTs can leverage this expertise and knowledge to more effectively co-design system changes and improve outcomes for their attributed population. The vision behind PCNs is that: PCNs will connect, integrate, and support primary care providers within OHTs to improve the delivery and coordination of care for patients.

The objectives to support the vision are:

- 1. To organize the local primary care sector in OHT planning and provide a voice in OHT decision-making;
- 2. To serve as a vehicle to support OHTs in the implementation of local and provincial priorities.

The core clinical priorities of PCNs and OHTs include:

- 1. Improve access and attachment to comprehensive primary care, with a focus on equity-deserving populations (e.g. Indigenous, Black, Francophone, etc)
- 2. Implement integrated chronic disease prevention and management strategies, with a focus on equity-deserving populations, as above.
- 3. Implement additional local priorities as defined be the OHT and PCN.

To support the vision, objectives and clinical priorities set out above, the following functions have been identified for PCNs.

- 1. The PCN connects primary care within the OHT.
- 2. The PCN serves as a vehicle for providing the local primary care sector's voice in OHT decision-making.
- 3. The PCN supports OHT clinical change management and population health management approaches.
- 4. The PCN facilitates access to clinical and digital supports and improvements for primary care.
- 5. The PCN supports local primary care Health Human Resource planning within the OHT.

CKOHT is committed to the development of a local PCN within our governance structure. CKOHT will work towards the vision, objectives, and clinical priorities laid out by the Guidance Document with our local primary care stakeholders to enhance primary care for the people and patients in Chatham-Kent.
